your child's key worker, and there are bits to complete at home as well. This way everyone involved in the child's care can share their achievements and take their needs into better account. Parents and carers are encouraged to take these home for an evening to enjoy as a family– just let your Key Worker know.

Open Doors Policy

Did you know that Ferryfield operates an **Open Doors Policy?** This means that parents are encouraged and welcomed to come by the Playgroup at any time to see what the facilities are like, discuss your child's progress with his/her key worker, or just sit in a corner and watch what happens. Ferryfield would not be able to function without parental involvement in the form of rota duties, and we of course would welcome any help offered outwith these duties as well.

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Wraparound Care

This pilot scheme offers parents and carers the opportunity to get to work on time (!) by having Playgroup open at 8:45. The Early-Risers programme allows children to be dropped off a halfhour before the usual opening time, a great advantage if you work in the area and need to start work at 9. To make life even easier, Ferryfield has also launched Lunch Club, a popular option that allows your child to have their lunch with their friends and continue to play for an extra 2 and 3/4 hours. Lunch Club finishes at 2:30pm, leaving parents and carers with that all too elusive lunch hour free to complete other tasks, knowing that their children are having a great time. The fees for these programmes are a very affordable, and places can be reserved by contacting the Manager.

Summer Fête

This year's fundraising effort was, we confess, not the greatest success ever- in fact, we only just managed to break even. This regardless of such activities as a goods stall, face painting, and games. However, we still think it's a great idea, and are planning on hosting our 2nd Annual Fête this June/July, which will be on an even grander scale; we have Firefighter and Ambulance crews waiting, and even more great activities for the whole family- not to mention a bigger and better choice of bric-à-brac, baked goods, caricatures and, of course, great food. Fundraising

Like many other organisations, Ferryfield Playgroup relies heavily on outside funding in order to keep functioning at the levels demanded by both parents and staff. The centre is in partnership with Fife Council for commissioned pre-school education places, and we therefore receive a proportionate amount of funding according to the number of eligible children we take in. Some monies are donated by charitable trusts such as Round Table, Rotary Club, and the Lottery Fund which last year allowed the refurbishment of the playroom and the provision of resources to comply with curriculum requirements. Other possible sources of income are the Scottish Pre-School Play Association, who

are part-funding the set-up for Wraparound Care, the Scottish Community Foundation and the Fife Childcare Partnership. The remainder of our income comes from donations from other parties, fees charged, and fundraising activities. Fundraising plays a huge role in any Playgroup-funds raised are sometimes needed towards running costs, in addition to helping out with the extras that are regularly required for toys, updating of facilities, rental costs of the theatre block for physical play, staff cover, etc... Last year's activities included a sponsored teddy toddle, sales of the class photograph, Tour of RAF Leuchars raffle, quiz night and the Gala, which all helped to raise modest sums. This year

we are planning the Anniversary Ceilidh, another class photograph, and a new and improved Summer Fête, to name but a few of the ideas being discussed. Fundraising relies on the efforts of the individuals taking part; the success of Ferryfield is due to the continuous support and involvement of not only Committee members, but parents and carers as well. All individual efforts to fundraise are very welcome; please remember to ask your employer if they would be willing to match any fundraising amounts, or if they are interested in sponsoring an event. Advertising in the newsletter is another inexpensive way to advertise their business.
